- requests to download an app or email with links

These are all scams, so hang up and don't give any information, or click on links.

Internet

This year, nearly all of us have relied on the internet far more than ever before. At the same time the level of crimes have increased significantly we are told.

Here are the basic most important good habits you need to get into and maintain.

- Choose, use and protect passwords carefully and use a different one for every online account. Use a strong password consisting of upper and lower case letters and numbers.
- Ensure you have up-to-date internet security software loaded on your computers and all mobile devices.
- To avoid the risk of your devices being hacked, always apply updates to operating systems and software.
- Never assume that Wi-Fi hotspots in public areas are secure.
- Always consider whether people 'are who they claim they are' online or on the phone.
- Don't click on links in emails, posts or texts and don't open attachments if the person or firm are not known to you.
- Never pay for anything by direct bank transfer unless its someone you know.
- Never reveal too much personal or financial information.
- · Always report fraud.

According to the Daily Telegraph crime correspondent 'You are 20 times more likely to be robbed while at your computer than held up in the street.' Now there's a thought!

A great rule to remember is: Think twice before actioning anything and if it seems too good to be true, it probably is.

In The Garden

Getting the Garden Spring Ready!

November feels like the end of the gardening year with flowers fading and leaves falling. There are days however, when you can accomplish a lot in the garden. If the weather is right, it is the perfect time to put a good layer of mulch between the plants left standing.

Brown soggy foliage can be cleared and weeds removed (there are always a few lurking underneath garden plants). Then you can give the garden a new lease of life with a fresh and nourishing layer of compost.

Ideally, you can use your own garden compost. This will top up your soil's bacterial and fungus levels, allowing your plants to access necessary nutrients and will act as a brilliant soil conditioner. Any organic matter that has broken down into humus will help to provide good growing conditions, but garden compost is the best.

For good compost, you ideally need two parts brown plant material to one part green matter (such as grass clippings). These need to be chopped up as small as possible and mixed and turned. Most of us probably don't have the time or inclination to be turning our compost heaps so we just leave it all in a heap. This is absolutely fine although it does take a lot more time and space. After twelve months the bacteria and fungi should have made some crumbly fine compost all by themselves. This will be underneath but it is well worth digging out to put around favourite plants.

So it can seem like the end of the gardening year with such short days and decreasing temperatures. Making and spreading compost is definitely a positive move towards preparations for the beginning of next year's garden.

It's Time to Make your Metals Matter!

Mid Devon District Council has teamed up with the metal packaging manufacturing industry and Recycle Devon to launch the 'Make Your Metals Matter' campaign to all its residents.

We use over 44 million cans, foil trays and aerosols every year in Mid Devon and the metal they are made from is endlessly recyclable. Mid Devon District Council is determined to make sure every last one makes it into your recycling container so that they can be transformed into something new.

To encourage metal recycling, Recycle Devon is giving five lucky Mid Devon residents who pledge to recycle the metal within their home a family ticket to one of Devon's Top Attractions in 2021. To pledge simply visit recycledevon.org/metal-matters by Sunday 6th December for your chance to win.

The 'Make Your Metals Matter' campaign will include leaflets sent to 37,109 homes and will be supported with social media with the aim of reminding residents to recycle all the metal packaging found around the home, including:

- · Food and drink cans
- · Foil trays
- · Empty aerosols
- Screw tops from glass bottles and jars
- Household aluminium wrapping foil

If all of the metal packaging used in Mid Devon's homes each year was collected for recycling it would save around 1191 tonnes of carbon dioxide, the equivalent to taking 253 cars off local streets for a year.

Used metal packaging can be recycled into new products at a far lower cost to the environment than making them from raw materials. Making drinks cans from recycled material saves up to 95% of the energy and greenhouse gas emissions needed to make both aluminium and steel from raw materials.

What's more, every time metal passes through the recycling loop the benefits are repeated, again and again and again!

Councillor Colin Slade, Cabinet Member for The Environment said: "We want to encourage our residents to think about metal packaging found throughout their home. Every can recycled saves enough energy to run a TV for four hours – so a small action like putting your empty bean tin into your recycling container can make a big difference. I would like to thank Mid Devon residents who are committed to recycling and reducing waste."

'MetalMatters' campaigns have run in over 107 local authority areas and reached over 6.5 million households since 2012. The Mid Devon campaign is being jointly funded by 'MetalMatters', an industry partnership comprising the UK's leading producers, users and recyclers of metal packaging and Devon Authorities Recycling Partnership.

The 'MetalMatters' programme is managed by the Aluminium Packaging Recycling Organisation (Alupro) on behalf of the funding partners.

Rick Hindley, executive director of project managers Alupro, said: "It is great to be able to work in partnership with Mid Devon District Council to promote the recycling of metal packaging. This campaign has delivered significant increases in the amount of metal packaging collected for recycling in other parts of the UK, so we are aiming to repeat – and hopefully better this – in Mid Devon."

Eco Council News from CB Primary School

Autumn Term 2020

Hello everyone and welcome to the Cheriton Bishop Primary School Eco Council.

Firstly we would like to share some of the amazing achievements that the Eco Council have managed so far this year:

- We have created battery, pen and crisp packet recycling points. These have been given to recycling centres, saving nonbiodegradable rubbish from going into landfill. Great work all!
- 2. We have installed the shelter over the bike rack to keep cyclist's seats dry through the day. We are going to protect it from the weather by painting it with recycled paint.
- 3. The Eco Council has run several assemblies to raise awareness about pollution, deforestation, palm oil and energy conservation.
- 4. We ran some successful fundraisers, including a massive cake sale and the very popular Rugby World Cup Sweepstake.
- 5. The Council ran an environmental review, created our Eco Board and have followed steps set out by a network of other Eco Schools to achieve our Bronze Award. We are completing steps to win our Silver.

Carbon Neutral by 2030

We have been in contact with one of the local councillors for Mid Devon's Climate Crisis initiative - Andrea Wood. She is keen to support the school's efforts to encourage children and staff to drive less and walk/ cycle more.

As a council we are finding out who can manage to commit to coming to school without driving. Using the initiative's budget, we will be getting some cool reflectors as a reward to keep those children safer on the roads over these darker months!

Mid Devon have committed to becoming carbon neutral by 2030 and this is an excellent way to encourage us at school to do our bit.

The Hog Hospital

We have discovered that there is a very small charity right here in Cheriton Bishop that cares for injured hedgehogs! We are meeting with them using Microsoft Teams to find out more about what they do and about how we can help protect hedgehogs in this area.

We had already decided that we would like to use some of our funds to buy and make some hedgehog homes for the community so this is a great way for us to find out about where best to place them from some local experts.

Tree Planting

The Woodland Trust will be sending us a selection of 15 trees, which we are aiming to plant in a few locations around Cheriton Bishop.

We have permission to plant 4 trees near the bank between the school field and the staff car park. We also have arranged to plant some at Crofters Mews and Dr Smith has said that he has some space in one of his fields, which is just up the road from school - we can't wait to get planting!

Other plans...

We are going through another Environmental Review in school to reassess what we could do better. We are looking into how we can improve the school's energy efficiency, how we can help with litter in the local area, how we can improve our awareness of the area's impact on water quality and how this impacts on marine water quality.

It has been a crazy year and it has never been more important for everyone to do what they can to look after our planet.

Message from St Mary's

The Start Of Long Nights & Short Days

British summertime is over and the nights are drawing in quickly. The evening begins with sunset at before five o'clock. The days are getting shorter during November. The shortest day is on 21st December when the day length is just under eight hours. It is no wonder that I feel the winter blues at the end of November, December and beginning of January. It seems nothing is changing very much until mid-January. If the days are approximately eight hours, then the nights are 16 hours long!! I certainly do not get any more sleep for the extra night time, I just work longer in darkness.

It is often the length of darkness and shortness of light that makes us suffer winter blues. For some people, this becomes full depression (Seasonal Affective Disorder, SAD) and they have to top up the light with a lightbox each day.

Darkness also brings with it the fear of the unseen and unknown. Inevitably the greater the darkness the greater the anxiety!

I am a little comforted that darkness is defined as the absence of light. It is light that is transformative and not darkness.

Light in darkness can be seen for miles. I imagine a lighthouse warning of the danger of rocks to ships many miles away, or on a practical note, a torch finding the keyhole on the car!

I am amazed by how a little light can affect the darkness. A green LED power light can be used to navigate in an otherwise dark kitchen. A full moon transforms darkness into a magical moonlight landscape. The moon is just reflecting a fraction of the sun's light towards the earth. At the end of November, Sunday 29th marks the beginning of Advent; the countdown to Christmas. The season of Advent uses the picture of God's light shining through people in history. Advent has a second dimension where we are called home to God's light.

We are reminded that we only get glimpses of God and heaven and only at the end of our earthly life do we fully know about heaven as we become part of it.

November has a bitter-sweet feel to it. We remember those who have gone before us in life and in death. It raises a mixture of both happy and sad memories. It reminds us also of our mortality which we very conveniently ignore or forget most of the time.

As we talk about the kingdom it is easy to think of earthly kingdoms which can model themes of overwhelming power, an unequal division of wealth and opportunities. These kingdoms reward a few privileged people at the expense of the majority.

Jesus models a radically different notion of inclusiveness and generosity.

The challenge for each of us is what sort of kingdom are we building, one just for us, or are we trying to encourage and include others?

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting

Held on the 12th of October 2020 using virtual Zoom technology as permitted by the Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus)

Present: Cllr Milton (Chairman), Cllr Bastyan, Cllr Benjamin, Cllr Salmon, Cllr Westcott,

Cllr Wood, Cllr Coren (MDDC), and Cllr Penny (MDDC)

In Attendance: The Clerk and 2 members of the public

1. To receive and accept apologies: Apologies had been received from Cllr Way (DCC).

 Co-option to Council to fill two vacancies: It was resolved to co-opt Emma Benjamin (Proposed – Cllr Milton, Seconded – Cllr Bastyan)

- 3. To receive declarations of interest to receive declarations of personal and disclosable pecuniary interest in respect of items on the Agenda: There were no declarations of interest.
- 4. Public Involvement: to receive public comment on items on the Agenda: One member of the public, a professional ecologist, spoke in support of Item 6 on the Agenda. He outlined an initiative to help combat the loss of wildflower meadows and assist in achieving a net gain in biodiversity by creating wildflower meadows in the Parish. He suggested changing mowing management and reseeding some areas. He offered to help Councillors develop an initiative.

One member of the public commented that the grid cover proposed at Item 15 was not the correct type and suggested an alternative.

One member of the public commented on Item 13 on the Agenda explaining that residents living at the east end of the village suffered unacceptable traffic noise from vehicles including motor bikes travelling too fast, even within the 30 mph zone. Some motorbikes perform wheelies outside the houses. Residents have parked their cars on both sides of the road to force drivers to slow down, but this should not be necessary and residents should not have to put their cars and insurance premiums at risk in this way.

- 5. Cheriton Bishop Council Meeting Minutes 14th September 2020 to consider the approval of the minutes as a correct record: It was resolved to approve and sign the minutes as a correct record
- 6. Biodiversity Gain: to consider wildlife habitat creation in the parish: Councillors were very supportive of the initiative outlined in public discussion. It was resolved to form a working party (Cllrs Benjamin, Salmon, Westcott and Wood) to develop, in conjunction with other community groups, a long term biodiversity plan for the Parish which will involve the community and include verges and the roundabout plus other areas such as the Village Green. The working party will report back to the Parish Council at the November meeting with budgeting figures.
- 7. Mid Devon District Council Planning Application to consider the following application upon which MDDC had asked the Council to comment:

Reference: 20/1454/HOUSE

Proposal: Erection of two storey extension Location: Amber Lewdon Farm Cheriton Bishop

Applicant: David Dodgeon

It was resolved to support this application with the comment that support is conditional upon the access from the road and driveway to the property, which is not shown on the plans submitted, is acceptable to the Planning Officer and Highways.

8. Mid Devon District Council – Planning Decision – it was noted that MDDC has refused permission for the following development for reasons as filed:

Reference: 19/01188/FULL

Proposal: Change of use of agricultural land to allow 1 pitch for the siting of 1 static caravan,

2 touring caravans and associated works for the use of gypsy and traveller family

Location: Land at Shortacombe Lane, Yeoford

Applicant: Mrs A Tyrer 16

Cheriton Bishop Parish Council

- 9. Climate Change to receive an update on Climate Change initiatives: Cllr Wood reported that she had spoken to the school about her proposed initiative to encourage children to walk to school when possible. The idea was well received. She now awaits hearing from the school and will report at the next meeting.
- **10.** Proposed Planning Reforms to consider a response to the Government's White Paper: After lengthy discussion of the draft response Cllr Westcott had circulated it was resolved to incorporate some of the comments suggested and then circulate the response to all councillors again before it is submitted.
- 11. Devon Air Ambulance Landing Site to receive an update: The Clerk reported that DAA is making progress on the proposed site but that fencing and the electricity supply have yet to be confirmed. DAA are not yet ready to give firm costings for the installation. Clerk to bring draft costings to the next meeting for budget discussions.
- 12. Hard to Recycle Items to consider the provision of recycling facilities for hard to recycle items in the parish: Cllr Salmon asked that further efforts be made to provide for the recycling of hard to recycle items, particularly plastic food wrappers. Clerk to liaise with Cllr Salmon.
- 13. Traffic Speed and Noise in Cheriton Bishop and local roads to consider next steps and a Community Speed Watch: Cllr Milton reported that the police had carried out some speed checks in the village on the previous Saturday afternoon. Cllrs commented that checks should be made at rush hour and busy times at weekends. The Neighbourhood Watch team have proposed two sites for a Community Speed Watch (opposite and adjacent to The Old Thatch). The Police will now assess those sites. Four volunteers will be needed to carry out the checks and they will first need training. Cllrs Benjamin and Milton and one member of the public volunteered.
- 14. Glebelands Play Area to receive an update on refurbishment: The Clerk reported that MDDC's refurbishment of the play area is due to commence on the 2nd of November. When it is complete the Parish Council will enter into a lease of the Play Area from MDDC. Clerk to bring costings to the next meeting so that they can be included in budget planning. Cllr Bastyan will write a short piece for the Newsletter and Facebook. Clerk to remind MDDC that the large oak tree on the boundary must be cut back before the commencement of the lease.
- 15. Flooding to consider how to remedy localised flooding on Church Lane: Cllr Wood reported on the frequent flooding that occurs on Church Lane as a result of poor drainage. The problem has been ongoing for several years and despite being reported to DCC and Highways, no action has been taken to remedy the situation save by local residents clearing blockages. It was resolved that the Parish Council would on this occasion purchase a grill/drain cover in an attempt to remedy the problem. Cllr Wood will check the specification of the grill/drain cover needed and take this forward.
- 16. Allotments to consider the provision of allotments within the parish: The Clerk reported that 8 parishioners had expressed interest in having an allotment. The landowner has explained that he expects to be ready to move this forward in the Spring. In the meantime the Clerk will research how best to set up the allotments. Clerk to update interested parishioners and check whether allotments are permitted on the Village Green.
- 17. Review of Assets to consider which assets will require repair or replacement before the end of the next financial year: The Parish Council has a responsibility to audit and inspect its assets each year. Cllr Wood reported that the two picnic benches on the Village Green are rickety and in need of repair. It was resolved that the benches should be replaced and that the new benches should be larger so that they can comfortably seat adults. Cllr Wood will research prices for the next meeting. The Clerk is to check whether the salt spreader, mower and strimmer need servicing or maintenance. Clerk also to check and report back on the terms of the Licence for the Village Green.
- 18. Projects/Items for Expenditure for 2021/22 to discuss ideas for the next financial year so that provision can be made in the budget: Glebelands play area, allotments, the war memorial site, the DAA Night Landing site, the Biodiversity project and a shed for storage of PC equipment were identified.

- 21. To receive a report from the Chairman (for information only): The Chair has arranged a meeting with Steve Tucker of Highways and Cllr Way at the War Memorial to discuss replacement of the unsafe surface. The Village Tidy up was very successful (including painting the bus shelters). The Chair thanked all who took part and in particular the organisers Tim Vooght, Peter Endacott and Cllr Coren. The application to re-register The Old Thatch as a village asset was successful. The registration will expire in September 2025. Thanks to the members of the public who had attended this evening's meeting.
- **22.** To receive a report from Councillors (for information only): Cllr Wood reported that the Parish Council Handbook is ready to circulate to all councillors.
- 23. To receive a report from Councillor Way (DCC): (for information only) Cllr Way was not present.
- **24.** To receive a report from MDDC Councillors (for information only): Cllr Coren reported on an estate hedge inspection and blocked drains at the bottom of Glebelands. There will not be a Remembrance Day Service this year but there will be an opportunity for the Parish Council to lay a wreath at the War Memorial. Clerk to order wreath.
- **25.** Correspondence to receive a report from the Clerk of correspondence received: No relevant correspondence that has not been previously reported.
- **26. Dates of Next Meetings: (to be on Zoom unless agreed otherwise)** 9th November, 14th December, 11th January, 8th February, 8th March

Glebelands Play Park Saved by CB Parish Council

The Parish Council has agreed to take on the responsibility of the play park located in Glebelands from Mid Devon District Council to avoid losing the play area altogether as it was at risk of closure.

In addition the Parish Council has agreed to the allocation of £35,000 of Section 106 money provided by developments in the area to refurbish the park. The refurbishment is due to begin on 2nd November 2020.
